Manors Little Leaguers TENTATIVE PLANS INDICATE NEW HOT LUNCH FACILITIES

Wilton Manors school children may at last be due for hot lunch facilities under state education department plans for an 11-room addition to the practically new elementary school building.

Only last week, the Broward County School Board gave a top priority to the local expansion project. It will be one of the first few of a total of 64 construction jobs to be undertaken in a \$10,000,000 countywide program.

This week, new information made it appear that badly needed lunchroom facilities may be included in the Wilton Manors pro-

The state department of education's planners say 10 new classrooms are needed here, plus other facilities including a cafetorium (combination lunchroom - auditorium), library and additional toilets.

Estimated cost is listed at S204.360.

No exact specifications have yet been announced. But the above facts make it appear that the 'cafetorium' would be included in the 11-room addition and that one of the 10 classrooms would be used in each month will be postponed as a library for some time, until until the following Friday, April all 10 are required for classroom

> Present plans call for construction to begin this year. The new rooms would be ready for occupancy by the opening of school in September, 1954.

> As reported in The Sun last week, Broward County will be one of the first counties to receive money from a new state school bond issue made possible by the voters' approval last November of Constitutional Amendment Num-

> And Wilton Manors thus will be one of the first communities in Florida to benefit.

At present, children in school here must either go home for lunch, if they live nearby, or forego the hot food they need and take cold package lunches to school.

3 tablespoons brown sugar 1/1 lb. butter

1 cup chopped pecans 1 cup flour vanilla

Cream butter and brown sugar. Add flour and pecans. Drop off spoon. Bake at 350 degrees on a buttered sheet, about 15 minutes.

A total of well over \$100 has been collected for the Tappan Fire Fund, organized for Mr. and Mrs. Lynn Tappan of Prospect Gardens, who lost their home and all the accumulated belongings of a lifetime

The actual total will be somewhere around \$115 . . . not a huge sum, but the nucleus for a new beginning for the Tappans.

One Sunday night last month, a sudden fire sparked from a faulty fusebox and in a manner of minutes completely destroyed the small residence at 13 Faillace Blvd. on which the Tappans had been working several years. Up in sparks and smoke also went all of their possessions, despite all the efforts of Oakland Park and Wilton Manors volunteer firemen to save something from the blaze.

There was no insurance whatsoever on the house or its contents, Mrs. Tappan said. Her husband is a guard at the state prison camp.

But by far the greatest contributions came in dollars, halves, quarters, dimes, nickels and pennies from Wilton Manors and Oakland Park citizens who dropped money into collection boxes placed throughout the two communities.

The fund was organized with the assistance of many people, with special efforts contributed by Henry A. Williams and the Rev. Warren Yates of Oakland Park and by the Rev. Russell D. Toms of Wilton ton Manors.
