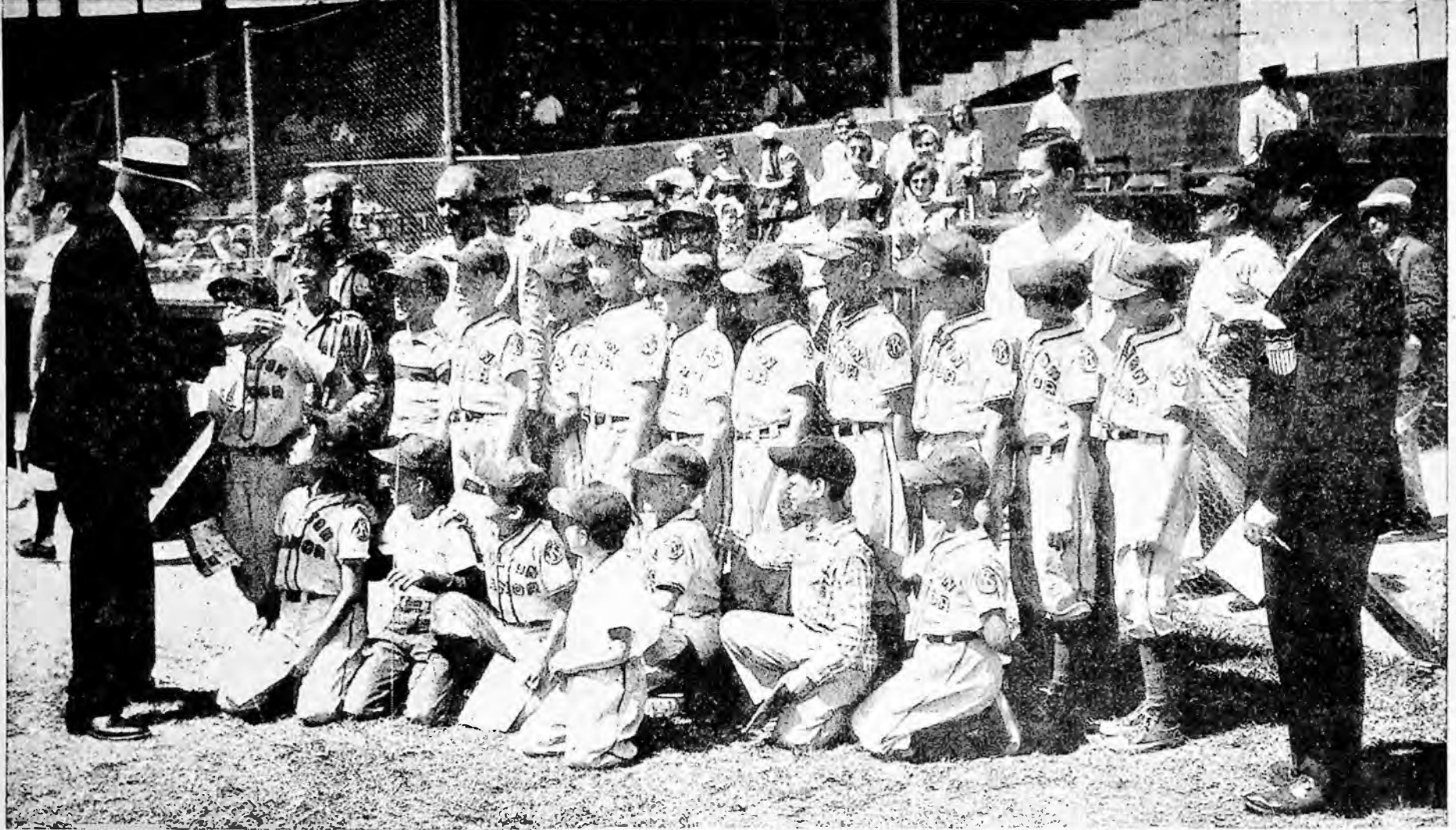

DUNTON "RESIGNS", COUNCIL "ACCEPTS"

Wilton Manors Councilman J. Marvin Brown, who has been after Water Engineer O. M. Dunton's scalp for a long time, finally collected it Tuesday night. But Council President Earle Middleton branded the "acceptance" of Dunton's resignation a "serious mistake" and declared he would ask the council to reconsider at its regular meeting next Tuesday.

After asking Water Superintendent Wallace Wakely if he felt ready to take the reins of the department, Brown moved that Dunton's resignation be accepted. Councilman Earl Gurney seconded the motion, forcing a roll call.

On the roll call, Councilman Frank Starling voted with Brown and Gurney; Councilman Jim Dea passed and Middleton voted no.

After the roll call, Middleton declared, "That was a mistake."

The council president later changed his vote to "yes," saying he did so on a technicality of parliamentary law.

There was a tense but well-controlled exchange between Middleton and Brown when Middleton promised to bring the matter up for reconsideration next week, saying he had had Dunton's resignation "in my pocket for three months."

"Was it addressed to you or to the council?" Brown demanded. "It was addressed to me," Mid-

Tuesday V-Day For Dogs

Next Tuesday will be V-day for Wilton Manors dogs.

All dogs in the Village are supposed to be inoculated against rabies and decked out in collar and license tag showing that they have been vaccinated.

Police Chief Richard Beaney announced this week that Dr. B. F. Balthaser, veterinarian, will be at the Village Hall on Tuesday afternoon from 4 until 6 o'clock to handle the inoculations. Cost is \$3 for inoculation and tag.

He told Middleton that so far as he is concerned, he would like the council's action to stand. The council president answered that he would discuss that with Dunton "in the morning."

"But one member," he added, "is addicted to snap judgments."

Dunton told The Sun:

"I don't mind; it was my desire to get out, but I do regret the way it was handled. I have done a lot of hard work."

Charter Act Requires Voters Okay

7-MILL LIMIT SET ON FUTURE LEVIES

When the time comes that taxes must be levied to run Wilton Manors' city government, councilmen will find that they must go to the freeholders of the Village in a referendum to get public approval.

Furthermore, the city charter will set a top limit of 7 mills as the maximum that can be levied.

Those are two of the provisions decided upon Tuesday night as Village Attorney William G. Miller Jr. got council guidance to finish the job of preparing the Wilton

VILLAGE COUNCIL CREATES 2 ZONES

A new zoning designation called I-1 and pronounced eye-one was created this week by the Wilton Manors Village Council.

The new zone is for strictly limited industrial use.

B-2 zone designation was set up for central retail use.

Bill Turner, Turner Supply Co., is applying for rezoning of property between the FEC railroad and Dixie Highway, for one block south from 26th Street. A public hearing on the request will be held April 28.

Thus, the people will have to clearly recognize the need before any property taxes may be levied.

And a top limit as low as 7 mills will be a tangible advertising point to dangle before people who might bring their families or their businesses to Wilton Manors.

With Homestead exemption, a residence assessed at \$10,000 would be taxed at only \$35 a year if the full limit were collected.

Moreover, many officials seem to think three or four mills would be adequate for a long, long time to come. Three mills on that same \$10,000-assessed house would cost the owner just \$15.

As one man put it:

"He could then demand sidewalks and street improvements and other things he knows he can't demand now, because everybody knows the Village hasn't got the money."

changes to come under the charter:

The Village will be known as the City of Wilton Manors.

A \$1,000,000 limit will be placed on the amount of general obligation bonds the municipality may issue.

A \$1200 annual salary will be top limit for council members and mayor (that doesn't mean they'll get it; it just means if they ever get any salary, it can't be over \$1200).

The mayor will have executive powers to act in certain emergencies, subject to later approval of the council.

The office of marshal will be eliminated, with the police chief holding top police authority.

A council member may be recalled if 25 registered voters petition the clerk, and then obtain a petition signed by 10 percent of the number of registered voters who voted in the last local election.

The council may appoint a member to serve until the next election in case of death or resignation of a member.

Ordinances passed by the council will be advertised, in substance.

The charter act will probably be forwarded to Tallahassee for introduction in the Legislature within the next 10 days.

FLIGHTS TO NASSAU MAY BE INCREASED

Scheduled flights to Nassau from Fort Lauderdale and Palm Beach will not be placed on a limited basis this summer, it was stated by Joseph C. Mackey, president of Mackey Airlines.

In fact, the airline is contemplating the addition of more scheduled flights because of increased tourist interest in the Bahama capital, Mackey disclosed.

Latest passenger figures released today by the airline show that 2,149 passengers were carried to Nassau during March. This represents a considerable increase over the February total of 1,803 and the January total of 1,100.

At the present time, Mackey Airlines is making three daily flights from Fort Lauderdale to Nassau and two from West Palm Beach.

Additional flights will be added to the schedule the moment traffic demands permit, Mackey stated.
