

The mayor will have executive powers to act in certain emergencies, subject to later approval of the council.

The office of marshal will be eliminated, with the police chief holding top police authority.

A council member may be reealled if 25 registered voters petition the clerk, and then obtain a petition signed by 10 percent of the number of registered voters who voted in the last local election.

The council may appoint a member to serve until the next election in case of death or resignation of a member.

Ordinances passed by the council will be advertised, in substance. The charter act will probably be forwarded to Tallahassee for introduction in the Legislature within the next 10 days.





Within the next several weeks as materials are delivered, the supply of water for the system will be nearly doubled, Hawkins said. But the softener system will be




