FIRE FUND GETS SURPRISE DONATION OF \$150 FROM PROMINENT DEVELOPER

The Tappan Fire Fund, closed out last week when a check for \$115 was presented to Mrs. Lynn Tappan of Prospect Gardens, was enriched to \$265 this week with an unexpected contribution.

Mrs. Tappan, victim of the December blaze which destroyed the home she and her husband had built, was overcome with emotion when she learned of the additional gift of Loomis D. Griswold, president of Prosperity Development Corp., and developer of North Andrews Gardens.

OFFICIALS EXPLAIN WATER'S BAD TASTE

In what may prove to be the understatement of 1953, water department officials in Wilton Manors and Oakland Park remarked this week that the water "doesn't taste very good."

After some nudging, they finally admitted that it tastes horrible. But they added that this is only temporary, and is unavoidable.

Water Superintendents Leon Groenboom of Oakland Park and Wallace Wakely of Wilton Manors put the blame for the bad taste and color on the improvement now going on at the source of the Oakland Park system.

While changes are being made in the filtering system, residents are getting water just as it comes from the well except that it is treated with chlorine to kill bacteria.

"That's the reason for the difference in taste and color," Groenboom said, but he added:

"We should have softened and filtered water again by about Monday."

Both superintendents emphasized that the water is perfectly clean and safe.

Oakland Park is spending some \$10,000 improving the system.

Wilton Manors Charter Bill Due In Late May

A bill to incorporate this community as the City of Wilton Manors will be introduced in the Legislature in late May, sometime after May 20.

A legal advertisement serving notice that the bill will be brought up in Tallahassee was published in a daily newspaper last Monday. At least 30 days must expire after advertising before the bill may be enacted.

The advertisement serves as a matter of record and describes the legislation to be offered.

This means that almost 30 days still remain for discussion and ironing out details of the charter, if that much time is needed.

LOCAL WOMEN TO ATTEND STATE OES MEETING

A number of Wilton Manors-Oakland Park women are making plans this week to attend the 1953 state meeting (Grand Chapter) of the Order of the Eastern Star, which opens Monday night at Miami Beach Auditorium and continues through next Thursday.

In one group will be Mrs. Elizabeth Tucker, assistant grand marshal for the session, past matron of Acacia chapter, and Oakland Park city clerk; Mrs. Emil Erickson of Oakland Park; Mrs. Paul McElhattan and Mrs. Charles Clark of Wilton Manors.

Mrs. Tucker will attend only the Monday night meeting. From there, she will go to Minnesota for a vacation. Mrs. Tucker expects to be gone about a month.

BEANEY WARNS OF SCHOOL VANDALISM

Youngsters, believed to be teenagers, are virtually wrecking Wilton Manors School, Police Chief Richard Beaney said this week.

Beaney added that vandalism will stop at once, or extreme measures may be taken to prevent it.

"Most of these youngsters are bigger boys who don't even go to school here. They have broken water heads off sprinklers, thrown rocks against the stainless steel slide, left water turned on, and caused other damage," the chief declared.

Beaney said the incidents occur after dark, and that youngsters are not to be allowed on the school grounds after sunset henceforth.

Flight passenger figures released this week by Mackay Airlines, operating between West Palm Beach, Ft. Lauderdale and Nassau, show that 2,149 passengers were carried to Nassau during the month of March.

FEC WILL INSTALL ELECTRIC WARNING FOR OAKLAND PARK

The Florida East Coast railway is going to install, after much prodding, a warning signal system at the Ocean Blvd. railway crossing in Oakland Park.

FEC officials notified county and Oakland Park authorities this week that the long-sought and much-needed signal will be set up in the very near future.

Only recently, two negroes lost their lives when a speeding train smashed their automobile at the crossing. Oakland Park has been trying for years to get signals installed there.

The railroad's notification to the county and city indicated the local signal is "next on its list" for installation and probably will be put in early in May.

WESELOHS UNHURT IN TRAIN WRECK

Mr. and Mrs. Edward Weseloh, 96 NE 21 Ct., Wilton Manors, were aboard the Atlantic Coast Line's Miami-New York streamliner. The Champion, which hurtled from the rails at Dillon, S. C., Monday night, killing several passengers and injuring more than 125.

The Weselohs, however, were reported more fortunate than many of their fellow passengers. Acquaintances of the couple here said it was understood that Mr. and Mrs. Weseloh were only shaken up and suffered comparatively mild shock in the railroad accident.

They were en route to New York, and had boarded the train at Ft. Lauderdale.

Twelve coaches, two lounge cars, two diners and a baggage car were derailed when the Champion jumped the tracks while traveling at an estimated 75 to 80 miles per hour near midnight Monday. Investigations were underway to try to determine the cause of the crash.

It probably will be about one year before work begins on a \$200,000, 11-room addition to Wilton Manors Elementary School.

That was the word from the county school board this week to The Sun and to a delegation of mothers who appeared before the board Wednesday wanting to know why the local construction project was not included among the very first to be carried out.

Superintendent O. K. Phillips told The Sun that the Wilton Manors job is number eight on a list of 15 Broward priority "A" projects to be carried out with money from a state bond issue.

Broward County, he explained, will receive a total of \$3,200,000 from the state to do these jobs, but only about \$2,230,000 of that amount will be available right away. The delay in getting the balance "probably amounts to putting Wilton Manors off one year", Phillips added.

The superintendent declared, however, that some of the other construction jobs to be done first will relieve crowded conditions here to some extent.

Another thing Phillips revealed was that no cafeterias, gymnasiums, or other such additions could be built with any of this state money until double sessions have been entirely eliminated in all county schools.

But he expressed belief that by the time Wilton Manors' addition is begun next year, that will have come to pass and a cafeteria can be included in the work undertaken.

The seven projects ahead of Wilton Manors include Dillard Elementary School (negro), Lauderdale Manors, Blanche Ely Elementary (negro) at Pompano Beach, Stranahan High School, Dania Junior High, West Hollywood Elementary and Riverland Village.

All except Riverland Village will be started almost at once.

Too Late to Classify

While it is extremely displeasing to the bureaucrats, who love their little "secrets", public opinion will applaud the action of the House for its smashing 81 to 7 vote in favor of opening the state welfare rolls. The people have a right to know where their tax money goes and if these rolls are made public it will go a long way toward eliminating chiselers.

Senator Branch of Hillsborough shows genuine concern for cigarette smokers and, in a bill which he terms "in protection of the public," he would make it a criminal offense for any merchant to sell cigarettes for less than cost. This is another one of those so-called "Fair Trade" bills that hit at merchants like Doc Webb of St. Petersburg who like to make their customers happy now and then by offering cigarettes at bargain prices. Just where such practice harms the customer in any way is hard to understand; but one thing is certain, it makes plenty sure that the cigarette smoker pays through his nose for his cigarettes.

Ever since the "Garden of Eden" snakes have had a bad reputation despite the fact that most of them are harmless and extremely helpful to mankind: A bill was introduced the other day that would prevent the importation into Florida of boa constrictor, anacondas, pythons, cobras and other poisonous snakes.

Evidently the author of the bill has little or no knowledge of his subject. Probably the best informed authority on snakes and reptiles in the country is Ross Allen of Silver Springs. Thanks to his work, millions of snakes have been saved and it is the poison from the fangs of Florida snakes that has been used to counteract

snake bite and aid sufferers from epilepsy, hemophilia, arthritis and pain from cancer.

Ross points out that most of the snakes mentioned in the bill are not poisonous and that they could not live in the wilds of Florida because of the climate and lack of natural food. He does, however, favor a bill that would require adequate cage facilities for poisonous snakes and a law that would require a permit from the State Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission for anyone keeping snakes in captivity. This would do away with the roadside shows that gyp the public and fly-by-night operators not concerned with the public welfare. Before taking any action legislators should read the letter on this subject which they received this week from Ross Allen.

Now if somebody would just introduce a bill in opposition to Pink Elephants, that would make sense.

VEAL BIRDS

Have your butcher cut two slices of veal steak, then cut each slice into three equal pieces.

Pound these pieces on each side. This will make them larger and very tender.

Spread each veal slice with your favorite bread stuffing. Roll them up, fasten with toothpicks, dip in flour and brown in hot fat.

Add a cup of hot water, cover tightly and simmer gently for one hour or more.

This makes six veal birds.

The total turned at the meeting by communities outside of Fort Lauderdale was \$14,740 in 274 gifts, bringing to \$41,283 the amount they have raised as of last Thursday in the public campaign.

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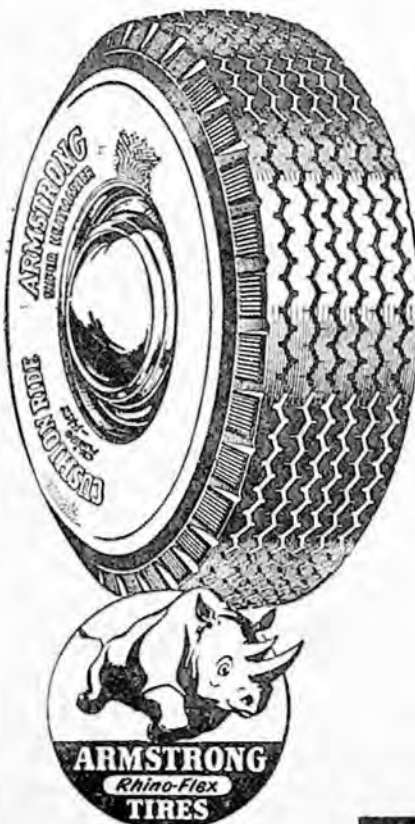
