

# HERBERT WIMBERLEY CONVICTED IN **NELS OLANDER SHOOTING; APPEALS**

48-year-old farmer Herbert Wimberley of Oakland Park was free on \$5,000 appeal bond posted this week after his conviction in the fatal shooting of his brother-in-law, Nels Olander, 44. Wimberley, who had been charged with second degree murder, was convicted of manslaughter by a six-man jury which deliberated about an hour before returning

a verdict. Criminal Court Judge -William T. Kennedy sentenced the state penitentiary at Raiford.

Wimberley's attorney immediately announced an appeal to the supreme court would be filed.

The shooting took place March 12. causing a sensation in Oakland Park where both men were well known. Wimberley declared he fired in the dark after being suddenly awakened by water thrown in his face. He said he did not know he was firing at Olander.

Mrs. Olander was not at home at the time.

Wimberley lived in the Olander home.

# **New Village Hall** Will Be Studied **On Tuesday Night**

Mayor Perry Mickel, members of the council, police and fire department representatives and anyone else interested will have an opportunity to discuss the plans at Tuesday night's meeting. Large sketches to be displayed reportedly are being ordered.

# Plan OK'd to Ease Wilton Drive Flood

Rumors that the Cunard White Star steamship line might make Wilton Manors a stop for its Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth were dashed this week as the Village Council approved a temporary plan to drain off the surface water which accumulates on Wilton Drive following every heavy rain.

Alvar Hagen, representing business property owners including himself, presented the proposal which involves grading along the west side of the Drive and installing tile troughs at two entrances to the Drive.

Hagen said this would serve as a temporary measure to drain away the greatest part of the water.

G. Miller, Jr., said he will fly to the capital early next week with the charter. It will be dropped into the legislative hopper by State Representative John S. Burwell of Fort Lauderdale.

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One clause inserted in the charter Tuesday night provides that occupational license fees charged by the municipality shall not in any case exceed the fee charged by the State of Florida.

Another specifies that in the event salaries are voted for members of the council, the salaries shall not take effect for a period of two years from the date of approval.

. That means no councilman who votes to approve salaries will get a chance to collect any without first facing the voters.

A third minor alteration provides for a 15-day period for candidates for office to qualify before an election. A candidate must file not more than 30 nor less than 15 days before the date of election.

The resolution approving the charter for presentation to the legislature was passed 3-0, with only Councilmen J. Frank Starling (who presided), Earl R. Gurney and J. Marvin Brown present.

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




