HERBERT WIMBERLEY CONVICTED IN NELS OLANDER SHOOTING; APPEALS

48-year-old farmer Herbert Wimberley of Oakland Park was free on \$5,000 appeal bond posted this week after his conviction in the fatal shooting of his brother-in-law, Nels Olander, 44. Wimberley, who had been charged with second degree murder, was convicted of manslaughter by a six-man jury which deliberated about an hour before returning a verdict. Criminal Court Judge William T. Kennedy sentenced Wimberley to serve five years in the state penitentiary at Raiford.

Wimberley's attorney immediately announced an appeal to the supreme court would be filed.

The shooting took place March 12, causing a sensation in Oakland Park where both men were well known. Wimberley declared he fired in the dark after being suddenly awakened by water thrown in his face. He said he did not know he was firing at Olander.

Mrs. Olander was not at home at the time.

Wimberley lived in the Olander home.

Holy Cross Fund Continues Rising

New subscriptions to the Holy Cross Hospital Building Fund have brought the total raised among local residents during the recent public campaign to \$7,416 for Oakland Park and \$4,983 for Wilton Manors. Mayor J. Dewey Hawkins is chairman of the Oakland Park committee and James C. Dean is chairman of the Wilton Manors group.

Robert C. Abel, public campaign chairman noted that new contributions have been coming into campaign headquarters steadily since the victory dinner on April 21. Charter Approved By Village Council, Goes to Tallahassee Next Week

A two-hour discussion ended near midnight Tuesday with the Wilton Manors Village Council giving final approval to a new charter which will create the City of Wilton Manors. Only a few minor alterations were made during the final discussion prior to introduction of the charter bill in the Legislature at Tallahassee. Village Attorney William

G. Miller, Jr., said he will fly to the capital early next week with the charter. It will be dropped into the legislative hopper by State Representative John S. Burwell of Fort Lauderdale.

One clause inserted in the charter Tuesday night provides that occupational license fees charged by the municipality shall not in any case exceed the fee charged by the State of Florida.

Another specifies that in the event salaries are voted for members of the council, the salaries shall not take effect for a period of two years from the date of approval.

That means no councilman who votes to approve salaries will get a chance to collect any without first facing the voters.

A third minor alteration provides for a 15-day period for candidates for office to qualify before an election. A candidate must file not more than 30 nor less than 15 days before the date of election.

The resolution approving the charter for presentation to the legislature was passed 3-0, with only Councilmen J. Frank Starling (who presided), Earl R. Gurney and J. Marvin Brown present.

Council President Earle Middleton was still in Broward General Hospital recovering from an operation and Vice President James C. Dean was unable to remain through the entire discussion because of other business.

A copy of the charter will be available at the home of the Village Clerk, Mrs. Marcia Stafford, 500 N. E. 25th St., for the benefit of anyone who may wish to examine the 51-page document during the daytime.

Golf Course Sale Rumor Is Refuted

Reports that Richardson Golf Course, an attraction which brings many visitors to Wilton Manors, has been sold, have no basis in fact.

That was the reply of Mrs. George Richardson, Sr., widow of its founder, when asked about the rumor by The Sun.

"We haven't even discussed it, and we wouldn't be interested," Mrs. Richardson declared.

She told the reporter such a rumor somehow gets started periodically, but denied firmly that there's anything to it.

The latest one circulated was to the effect that the course would be turned into a private club with swimming pool and other added facilities.

A recent Village Council decision gave the golf course exemption from any future municipal ad valorem tax so long as it remains a golf course.

Oakland Park Gets New Street Lights

If you can't see your way around in Oakland Park at night, either see an oculist or go home and sleep it off.

More than two dozen new street lights have been installed, adding considerably to both visibility and attractiveness of the city.

Plan OK'd to Ease Wilton Drive Flood

Rumors that the Cunard White Star steamship line might make Wilton Manors a stop for its Queen Mary and Queen Elizabeth were dashed this week as the Village Council approved a temporary plan to drain off the surface water which accumulates on Wilton Drive following every heavy rain.

Alvar Hagen, representing business property owners including himself, presented the proposal which involves grading along the west side of the Drive and installing tile troughs at two entrances to the Drive.

Hagen said this would serve as a temporary measure to drain away the greatest part of the water.

As one waggish councilman observed later, this would save the expense of building docks and piers.

"We've got enough problems without inviting waterfront vice and longshoremen's unions," he added.

All hands seemed agreed that eventually storm sewers will have to be installed.

C. Wilson Brown, who has been making an engineering study of the situation without charge, said surveyors already have gone over the job with a view toward future installation of drainage lines.

Plan Board Offers Ideas On Cleanup

Merchants in Wilton Manors will be asked to help create a system for keeping the Village neat if the Village Council follows a suggestion put forward by its 10-man planning board.

The board will recommend that merchants be asked to place wind-proof trash receptacles in front of their places of business for trash, paper, gum and candy wrappers, etc.

Two other recommendations were forwarded to the council over the signature of Board Chairman Alvar Hagen:

Periodic cleanup of Wilton Drive by the garbage department or someone hired for that purpose, and

An ordinance providing stiff penalties for anyone throwing trash, bottles, or any kind of waste matter from passing automobiles.

Councilmen asked the planning board for its ideas on the subject of neatness after the matter came up several weeks ago.

Change In Pay Scale Is Approved For Patrolmen

A new starting pay schedule for patrolmen and a \$5 weekly raise for Patrolman Bob Hickman has been approved by the Wilton Manors Village Council. The action came Tuesday night on recommendation of Chief Richard Beaney.

The chief told the councilmen he's found it hard to get a qualified patrolman to start work on the old system of \$55 weekly for the first three months probationary period with a raise to \$60 at the end of the three months. Council therefore agreed to

make it \$60 from the beginning. Other actions of the board included these:

Approved Beaney's request to change the Wilton Manors police radio to the new sheriff's department frequency instead of Fort Lauderdale police frequency.

Okayed the police chief's expenses up to \$30 for the convention in Orlando next month of the Florida Police Chiefs Association, Inc.

Approved a new city charter (see story on Page 1).

FILLED ANGEL FOOD CAKE

- 2 tbs. gelatin
- 2 cups milk
- 4 egg yolks
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1/8 tsp. salt
- 1 pint whipping cream

Use the fine angel food prepared mixes, or, if you feel ambitious, bake your own favorite angel food cake. Slice cake through center to look like a two-layer cake.

Soak gelatin in cold milk and dissolve over boiling water. Allow to cool thoroughly. Beat egg yolks, sugar, vanilla and salt. Add to milk and gelatin; let stand until mixture begins to thicken, then add to beaten whipped cream. Beat until smooth.

Now fill bottom layer and place second layer over. Cover top and sides generously and fill the center with the remaining filling.

Toasted almonds and maraschino cherries, cut up and sprinkled over top and sides, makes this filled angel food cake a treat for the gods!
