Fireworks Banned In Wilton Manors, Says Police Edict

Independence Day revelers got a warning from the Wilton Manors police department this week.

Patrolman Bob Hickman, who is senior officer during the vacation of absent Chief Richard Beaney, pointed to a city ordinance which makes it illegal to buy, sell or possess fireworks, including sparklers, within the Wilton Manors city limits.

Hickman said the law will be enforced strictly on July 4.

Sparklers, he declared, are widely thought to be virtually harmless but they can inflict severe burns and they are illegal.

The ordinance gives the police authority to seize any fireworks found in the city limits and gives the municipal court power to levy a fine up to \$100 or 90 days imprisonment for violation of the ordinance.

Police Chiefs Attend Florida Police Confab

Police Chiefs J. M. Barnhill of Oakland Park and Richard Beaney of Wilton Manors returned this week after attending a convention of the Florida Police Chiefs Association at Orlando.

Beaney departed again almost at once, en route to New Jersey where he will spend his vacation.

Barnhill had high praise for the recently-formed association of police chiefs.

"Best thing ever organized," he declared.

The Oakland Park chief explained that the conventions give police department heads a chance to compare problems, discussing ways and means of solving them, and swap experience.

"It's a democratic type of association where you can get up and say what you think," he added.

Preparations for constructing a new Wilton Manors City Hall east of the Florida East Coast railway in Middle River Estates moved quickly ahead this week with a series of meetings and the start of a fund raising campaign. A large and enthusiastic group of Wilton Manors citizens and city officials met Tuesday night and again Wednesday.

SPECIAL ELECTION IN OAKLAND PARK IS SCHEDULED FOR AUGUST FOURTH

August 4th has been set as the date for a special election to be held in Oakland Park to give the city's voters an opportunity to express themselves on several local bills passed during the session of the State Legislature just concluded. Mrs. Elizabeth Tucker, city clerk, announced this week that voters' registration books for persons not already registered will open June 29 and close July 29 prior to the referendum.

A special meeting of the Wilton Manors City Council will be held next Tuesday night at 8 o'clock. It was announced this week.

Mrs. Marcia Stafford, city clerk, said several subjects of importance will be discussed by the council in the special session.

\$20,000 Bonds OK'd For Church Building Project

The annual Vacation Bible School of Covenant Presbyterian Church will come to a close on Friday evening at 7:15 P. M. with the awarding of certificates at the closing exercises.

The enrollment this year reached an all-time high with 193 pupils and teachers enrolled. At the closing program the various classes will present various phases of what has been accomplished in this two-weeks school.

The pastor, the Rev. Russell D. Toms, has announced that the Church is now engaged in an effort to complete the Educational and Fellowship Hall units in order to meet the need of this growing community. The congregation has approved a \$20,000 bond issue; therefore efforts are now being made to subscribe this at the earliest possible moment, and to this end every member and friend of the Church is urged to make as large a subscription as possible. Bonds shall be issued in denominations of \$25, \$50, and \$100, bearing interest at the rate of 5% per year with a ten year maturity date. Information can be secured by calling the church office at 3-9847, the pastor stated.

During the coming week, the pastor will be a Quest Leader at the Pioneer Youth Camp at Camp Weekiwachee near Brooksville, Florida. Two of the local Pioneers, Miss Patsy Hendricks and Miss Karen Clark, will be camping there during this time, also.

Among questions to be voted upon is an amendment to the city charter providing that the entire cost of street improvements be assessed against property owners who benefit, instead of having part of the cost paid from the city's general funds.

Recent annexations of territory to the city limits also will be submitted to the voters for approval.

Another charter amendment gives the city council authority to establish all salaries of city employees rather than have some of them fixed by the charter itself.

Mrs. Tucker said qualified voters who haven't registered will be able to sign up anytime during regular city hall hours after the books open June 29.

She emphasized that it will not be necessary for citizens now registered to register again. Residents who are not certain whether their names are on the rolls should check with the clerk.

Sunday School Classes Stage Big "Hobo Party"

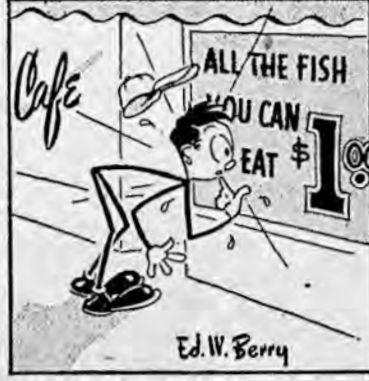

Every indication points to another record-breaking summer tourist business for Florida. Transportation companies have discovered that Florida can be sold as a summer playground as well as winter, and are beaming their promotion efforts in this direction. Each summer more and more people visit the state. They have returned home and told neighbors and friends that Florida has plenty to offer the summer vacationist including an air-conditioned climate, cool nights, reasonable accommodations and entertainment to meet every taste.

Folks who used to scoff at the idea of visiting Florida in the summer time under the assumption that because it is warm in the winter it must be twice as hot in the summer, are now scheduling their Florida visit for this season of the year.

Long before most Florida communities awoke to the fact that summer promotion would pay off, alert Daytona Beach began selling itself as a summer resort. Each year it has increased its summer business. Hundreds of new hotels, motor courts have popped up like mushrooms and still the area is hard pressed to provide accommodations for all who want to come.

Eastern and National airlines led the way in selling Florida as a summer resort. They popularized "piggy bank" vacations and package deals that appealed to everyone.

Greyhound Lines and the "conducted tour" people hopped on the bandwagon and found the butcher, baker and candlestick maker were all prospects. Hotels and resorts that for years had made a practice of closing each summer began staying open. They found it paid off. Rates were reduced both for transportation and hotel accommodations but the steadily increasing volume of business made it worthwhile.

Railroads finally woke up and are now carrying their share of summer travelers and are advertising for more.

Florida's summer convention business has boomed. The chance to combine convention business with a wide variety of sport and en-

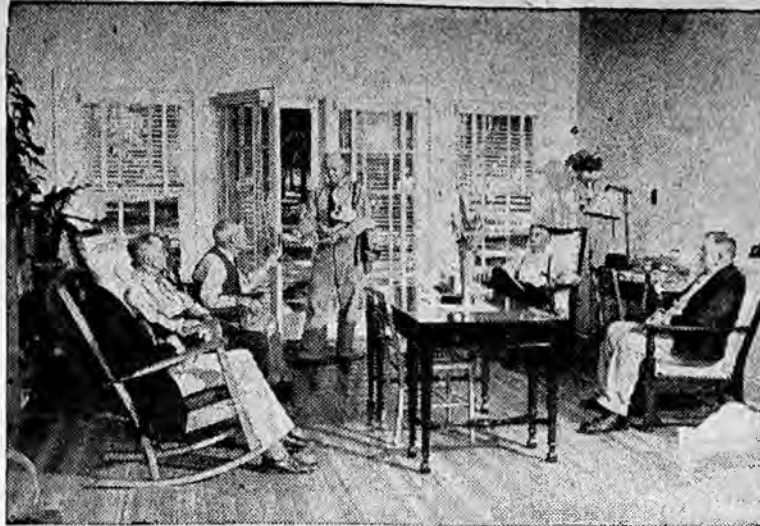
tertainment, deep sea fishing, golf, swimming, boating and night-clubbing while enjoying the comfort and luxurious living afforded by swank hotel and deluxe motor courts, made the convention bureau manager's job an easy one.

These conventioners, Shriners, American Legion, Elks and countless others who came here in summer excepting to "roast to death" found it so delightful they came back again and again and brought their friends with them.

Taking cognizance of the potential possibilities of developing more and more summer travel to Florida, the Florida State Advertising Commission has been budgeting more and more for this type of tourist promotion and has found it money well spent. It will be able to do an even better job now that the appropriation has been increased.

Florida attractions people—Silver Springs, Cypress Gardens, and others—have never discounted summer possibilities and have conducted selling campaigns the year round, and their attendance records reflect the wisdom of this action.

Florida's greatest tourist revenue comes from motor tourists who drive their own cars to the state. That is why it is so important that we provide adequate highway facilities. If the turnpike and toll highways are the answer, the sooner we provide them the better. Floridians should keep ever in

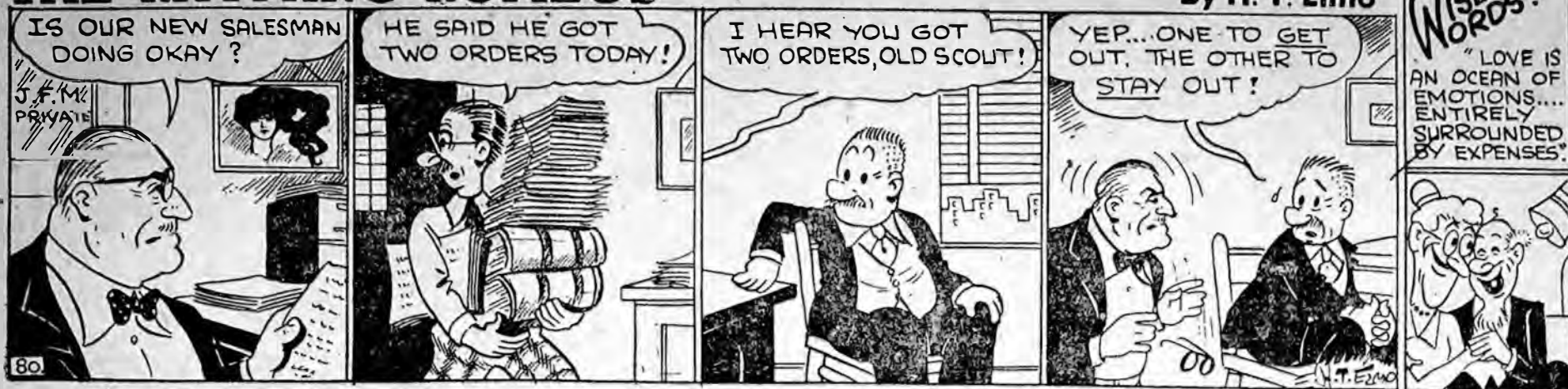

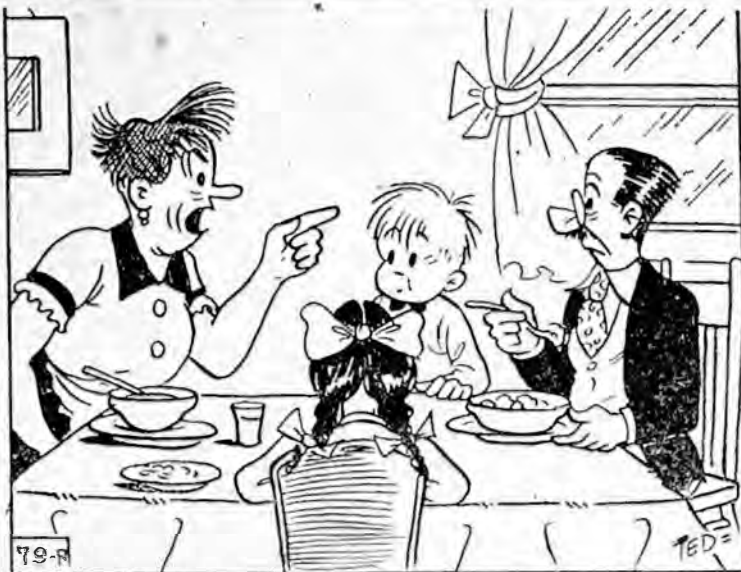

**WASHINGTON AND
"SMALL BUSINESS"**

Mutual Security Agency, successor to Marshall Plan, has released a voluminous report many in Washington call "White Paper to Justify Worldwide Cartel Arrangements."

Officially called an evaluation report, it is derived from recommendations of 54 U. S. businessmen who visited a few of the 50 nations receiving U. S. aid.



The roster of investigating businessmen is studded with heads of U. S. firms who occupy near monopoly positions, as well as international financial houses.

For example, a recommendation is made that MSA, which with the Marshall Plan has already cost American taxpayers over thirty billion, and which was set up for emergency conditions, now be made a permanent State Department branch.

And although eleven different study groups composed the report, there was majority agreement on certain points.

A major recommendation was the abolishment of the Sparkman and the Benton-Moody amendments to Mutual Security law, as well as all other regulations aiding small business.

Thus, any regulation requiring small business to share in expenditures for goods given away, should be eliminated.

And, in receiving nations, there should be no regulations preventing U. S. aid being used to build foreign monopoly business.

Reports that MSA employees abroad live in luxury were minimized.

Yet, the report does state that in Paris, for example, MSA employees are paid considerably higher than comparable salaries in Washington, D. C., that employees' standards of living are creating envy and criticism in foreign lands; and that many employees are maintaining large homes staffed with servants.

In Italy, the investigators found an abundant labor supply, which the report states is an attraction to private capital. Military spending in Italy should be continued, it is recommended, with the provision, however, that U. S. dollars should be spent in Italy for Italian made goods.

It is also recommended that the U. S. purchase in Italy autos, textiles, and food.

This last item causes great amusement in Washington.

Facts are—Italy does not produce enough food to feed her own; the U. S. has given millions in food to Italy to prevent starvation. Yet, the "experts" say U. S. should buy food in Italy.

Also significant was unanimous agreement where to cut MSA spending.

The cut, it is recommended, should be made in MSA information services, which report where and when American tax dollars are spent abroad.

Stripped of surplus words, the report recommends:

1. That U. S. permanently continue to spend billions abroad.
2. That no protection be given U. S. small business or agriculture.
3. That no prohibitions be retained barring use of U. S. taxes to build European monopolies.
4. That the public be told less about what is going on.
