Then in a separate editorial take Mr. LeFevre to task if you differed with him on his subject matter. Membership of these organizations totals over 500 and indicates a city-wide interest with definite prospects for the success of the Building Committee plans.

It was voted to send a letter to every resident of the city to inform them of the emphatic need. of the advantages to the city and to every property owner

Only approximate eost of the improvement is available since the plans are being revised by the architect. Figures mentioned rang ed from \$25,000 to \$35,000.

Financing is expected to be provided, in part by public subscription, by certain allotments from present funds of the City, and by contributions of labor and materials by public spirited citizens

The present old Village Hall, at NE 26th Street and Fifth Avenue now wholly inadequate, was constructed five or six years ago almost wholly by voluntary cooperation. Wilton Manors has always been noted for public spirit when a definite need is shown and Mayor Mickel is convinced the new City Hall for Wilton Manors will soon

be a reality.
