Oakland Park Adopts-Record Budget Of More Than \$91,000 For Next Year

A record budget of \$91,642.39 was adopted this week by the Oakland Park City Council for the 1953-54 fiscal year. The City's tax rate will remain at 14 mills or \$14 per one thousand dollars of taxable assessed valuation. Total assessed value of properties in Oakland Park is \$2,637,409. That figure, however, does not include certain business property which will be added in later.

Based on the figure above, after subtracting \$1,304,460 in home-stead exemptions, the 14 mill tax should produce nearly \$19,000.

The city figures on collecting about \$37,000 from water sales as its biggest source of income. The 5c state cigarette tax, which is returned to the city is estimated to produce \$12,000 and the Florida Power and Light Co. franchise another \$3,300.

As for expenses, a \$14,000 estimate was set for salaries, but that estimate probably will prove to be high.

It does, however, include provision for possible pay raises for

some city employes and a proposed new system of paying councilmen's salaries.

This has been discussed, but no action has been taken and no decision made, according to the officials.

A tentative figure of \$50 a month has been talked about for members of the council, with the mayor to receive \$60 monthly.

At present, councilmen get \$5 for each meeting they attend.

The mayor gets \$10 monthly, plus \$1 for each court case he handles as municipal judge, regardless of whether the verdict is guilty or not guilty.

Work Gets Underway On Oakland Park Project To Boost Water System

Construction started this week on a \$7,000 project designed to expand the capacity of Oakland Park's municipal water system.

The Oakland Park plant also serves Wilton Manors, North Andrews Gardens, and several subdivisions which have signed contracts with Oakland Park to receive water.

Maximum time set for completion of the job is 50 working days, city officials said.

When it is finished, the plant is expected to be able to produce an additional 12,000 gallons per hour, or 288,000 gallons per day.

The project also includes provisions which are supposed to end, once and for all, persistent complaints about the color and taste of the city water.

City Officials Study Proposal To Build \$50,000 Wilton Manors Pool

Plans for a \$50,000 municipal swimming pool which could pay for itself and perhaps raise revenue for the city will be brought to the attention of Wilton Manors city council members. The Sun learned this week. It was discovered that members of the city's 10-man, long-range advisory planning board look favorably on the idea. The plan, the board, at a recent meeting, decided to draft a letter to the city council calling its attention to several facts about the proposal and suggesting that it be gone into thoroughly.

A representative of the construction firm which specializes in swimming pools met with the planning board members to discuss the proposed Wilton Manors

project. What he told them, among other things, was that a pool about 35 feet wide and 72 feet long would cost in the neighborhood of \$50,000. And, rather than build a pool bigger than that, a better idea would be to build more than one pool.

Hopes Rising For New FEC Crossing

New hope sprang up this week for almost immediate action on a new crossing of the Florida East Coast railway at NE Third Avenue in Fort Lauderdale.

Such a crossing would open up a new route to city shoppers who have learned they can do better in the Wilton Manors shopping districts. It also would be helpful to hundreds of Wilton Manors and Oakland Park residents who work in Fort Lauderdale and must travel to the big city every day.

Fort Lauderdale City Manager Milton H. Link was quoted as saying this week that the new crossing should be "completed before winter."

Link made this statement after a trip to Jacksonville where he and Mayor Malcolm Carlisle talked with FEC Trustee Scott M. Loftin about several matters affecting the railroad.

Efforts to get a NE Third Ave-

nue crossing built have been underway for years and Wilton Manors businessmen have cooperated in the efforts as far as they could.

It is anticipated that the crossing will increase traffic to a point where the City of Fort Lauderdale will be forced at last to rebuild NE Fourth Avenue leading to Wilton Manors.

The street is in such a state of disrepair that it has become a laughing-stock, and at the same time a menace to public safety.

Mrs. Patterson Dies

Mrs. Emma Patterson, grandmother of Mrs. J. T. Kelley, 601 NE 29th Drive, Wilton Manors, died Wednesday at the age of 98.

Mrs. Patterson had been active until a few weeks ago when she suffered a broken hip in a fall. Mrs. Patterson came here from Indiana some 18 months ago.

Survivors, in addition to Mrs. Kelley, include two grandsons, both of whom are residents of Miami, and eight great-grandchildren.

Wilton Manors Officer Attacked By Prisoner

Wilton Manors Patrolman John Lynch was back on duty this week after being hospitalized briefly due to the effects of a physical attack by a prisoner being booked.

The prisoner, identified by Lynch as Henry Pass, alias Johnny Pass, 23, of Port Everglades, was still in Broward County jail at last report.

Charges of assault and battery were filed against Pass as a result of the attack on the Wilton Manors officer.

Lynch suffered a black eye, a kidney injury, and bruises.

The assault occurred in the sheriff's office in the court house at Fort Lauderdale as Pass was being booked on a drunk charge.

Thus was raised the possibility that the city might get a swimming pool on the east side of Andrews Avenue at the present time, and a second one on the west side of Andrews Avenue later on, as the growth and development of the western side warrants such a move.

Eventually, an arrangement like that could be quite satisfactory, some officials think.

For one thing, it would remove the necessity for children living west of Andrews to cross that busy thoroughfare to get to a pool.

One possible site for the first pool, discussed by the board, is a strip of land immediately north of the proposed new City Hall site on NE 26th Street.

If a large enough area there could be obtained, there would be room to add tennis courts, a basketball court, and a park and picnic grounds in addition to the swimming pool.

Washington Newsletter

Senator Smathers, beginning his fall visitings in Florida, has temporarily turned over his column to Truman Felt, of the Miami Daily News and Florida Times-Union, who has prepared an objective appraisal of Smathers' work in the session of Congress just completed.)

WASHINGTON—In legislative issues of direct interest to Florida both of the state's senators have been not only in agreement but rivals only in efforts to give the most help. Both, however, insist that the Florida projects meet what in their opinion is the test of "sound economy" rather than mere "pork barrel legislation" or favors at the expense of other taxpayers.

They fought together for more flood control funds, airport development, research into citrus diseases, two federal judges for the overburdened and misnamed Southern Florida District that includes most of the state from Jacksonville south, plus many other objectives.

Smathers was the chief advocate, however, of reform in the method

of selecting presidential candidates and in the electoral college, an effort that seems to be gaining momentum, while Holland was recognized for his successful fight to enact tidelands legislation recognizing the rights of states within their historic boundaries.
