EDITORIAL COMMENT—

Good Turnout, Bad Politics

The people have spoken. Or, rather, half of the people have spoken.

Only 305 ballots were cast out of more than 800 registered voters in last week's election.

At that, it was a pretty fair turnout, just 63 less than voted last year when the Presidential election brought them to the polls.

It appeared for a time we would have a reasonably clean election. Then, only some three or four days before election day, someone started circulating a rumor to the effect that the deed to the city hall site east of the FEC, given to the city by the developers, was full of trick clauses.

It smelled like a deliberate and unclean attempt to influence citizens not in position to know better.

Fact: only reversion clause in the deed is that the property must be used and continue to be owned by the public for a public building site. This is a clause nearly always included in deeds conveying gifts of real estate to municipalities.

Maybe this false rumor affected the election, maybe not. This newspaper supported no candidates and does not question the outcome.

The oldest and dirtiest trick in politics, however, is to turn public benefactors' good deeds against them by making them appear to have ulterior motives.

There is no place in a free city like Wilton Manors for dirty politics.

One more thing we can do without is secret meetings on public business. Any time politicians want to decide issues affecting the people's affairs, it behooves them to do so in public.

The public doesn't care whether their officials get along with each other, or whether they agree on issues. But the people insist on hearing it straight while it's being decided, not afterwards.

The City Charter gives them that right, and in clear terms. (See election news, this page)

Oakland Park Race Gets 3 Candidates

Three candidates were entered this week in Oakland Park's 1953 city political contests for mayor, city clerk and city council.

Councilman Charles M. Hunter qualified as a candidate for re-election while W. Ralph Green, president of the Oakland Park Volunteer Fire Department, also became a contender for one of the three city council vacancies.

Mrs. Elizabeth Tucker, veteran city clerk, filed for re-election to her post.

To date there are no candidates entered in the mayor's race.

Mayor Dewey Hawkins is generally expected to be a candidate for re-election but, if so, probably will not file for some time.

Councilman T. C. Moore is not expected to seek another term, but Councilman Bill Stevens probably will, according to reports.

Councilmen Dick Stott and Colbie White are holdovers.

Candidates have until November 27 to qualify, while citizens who are not registered as voters may do so on or before December 2.

Mickel, Stafford Poll 528 Votes

Mayor Perry Mickel and City Clerk Marcia Stafford received enthusiastic nods of approval from Wilton Manors voters in last week's election.

Although neither was opposed on the ballot, 288 of the 305 voting took the trouble to mark his name for reelection and 280 made x's beside Mrs. Stafford's name.

Gurney Gets Council Presidency On 2-2 Vote Under Rules of Procedure

A new Wilton Manors City Council was "organized" Tuesday night. It took less than 2 minutes for it to become the most disorganized ever seen in the Village Hall. The Council, with two new faces at the table, promptly split wide open and evidently will stay that way for an indefinite time. The two new faces were those of Clarence B.

Riggs and Charles A. Saxer, who were elected over Earle L. Middleton and James C. Dean last week.

The third candidate elected was incumbent Councilman Frank Starling who led the entire field by a wide margin with 154 votes out of 305 ballots cast in the election.

Riggs was 20 votes behind Starling, Saxer squeaked in by a mere one-vote margin over retiring Council President Earle Middleton. Saxer had 118 votes, Middleton 117, following a second count of the ballots.

Dean polled 108, C. Wilson Brown 99, William Pabor 69 and Guy Smith 52.

It was obvious on Tuesday night that Gurney was to be nominated for council president, especially in view of the fact that Saxer, Riggs and Gurney had held a private session Tuesday morning, together with the fact that Gurney's name had been widely mentioned for the post some days before that.

It will take concentration to follow this, but here is what happened:

Saxer nominated Gurney, seconded by Riggs. Councilman Marvin Brown, a holdover, attempted to nominate Starling, pointing out that Starling was high man in the election and the only one who polled a majority from the ballots cast.

Starling, however, said he wanted to nominate Brown for president on the grounds that Brown had the most experience as a council member of the five on the board.

On the roll call on Gurney's nomination, Saxer and Riggs voted yes while Brown and Starling voted no. Gurney himself, not wishing to cast a deciding vote for himself, passed.

An embarrassingly long silence followed. Then Mayor Perry Mickel asked City Attorney William G. Miller what the score was. Miller advised that Gurney would take

The session was unproductive.

Next day, however, Councilmen Earl Gurney, Clarence B. Riggs and Charles A. Saxer held a private meeting with Councilman Earl Gurney at his home at 11 a.m.

It was there, apparently, that final decisions were made on running the city.

Councilmen Frank Starling and J. Marvin Brown said they were not invited. Both said they would not have attended had they been notified of the meeting.

the chair since neither of the other two nominations had been seconded.

What followed next, after the invocation by the Rev. R. D. Toms, was the nomination of Saxon by Riggs to be fire commissioner

Starling seconded that one, and Riggs nominated Brown for road commissioner and Saxon quickly seconded the nomination.

But then came an effort to replace Brown with Saxon as police commissioner. First, Starling nominated Brown to continue in the post. There was no second.

Then Riggs nominated Saxon. No second. Result, no police commissioner.

Apparently to get Brown out of

the way in another assignment, Riggs nominated Brown for road commissioner and Saxon quickly seconded the nomination.

Brown, however, replied: "I refuse it."

City Attorney Miller offered his resignation as a courtesy to the new Council. It was refused by a 4-0 vote, with Riggs passing. Riggs explained he abstained due to lack of knowledge of the city's legal affairs.

It looked like a long winter might be ahead.

Watering Of House Plants Is A Job Requiring Plenty of Care, Know-How

An important point to remember about watering is that it should be done regularly. A plant is just as sensitive to the proper timing for a drink as you or me. When it is watered one day and forgotten the next two days, its growth and beauty are affected. The best thing to do is form a habit in watering, i.e., water at 8 a.m. or 3 p.m. every other day—then keep to those times. Do it regularly.

Most houseplants should be watered every day or every other day. However, plants in the Cactus family require water only once or twice a week. Plants potted in larger containers generally do not require watering as often as those in smaller pots.

A plant should be watered thoroughly. The soil should be moistened all the way through, not merely at the surface.

Considering the harmful effects of standing water, it follows that

one should never water a plant by pouring water in the pot's saucer and depending on the roots to pick it up. Remember that nature's way of watering plants is from the top, letting the moisture settle down to nourish the roots by carrying food from the soil to them. Plants with delicate and sensitive leaves can be watered by lifting the leaves and watering the soil.

Blooming plants require a little more water than green foliage plants. Care should be taken not to water them too heavily during cloudy weather. Too much water on dull days and poor drainage have caused many a plant to lose its flowers before its time.

Diabetes Week To Start November 15

Diabetes Week will be observed in Broward County November 15-21 under the chairmanship of Dr. F. D. Pierce. His appointment to head this educational and case finding campaign was announced today by Dr. A. C. Peterson, president of the Broward County Medical Association, which is cooperating in a nation-wide program sponsored by the American Diabetes Association.

Aim of the campaign is to find an estimated million Americans who have diabetes but do not know they have it. For that reason, the county wide campaign is known as the Diabetes Detection Drive. Once found, medical authorities point out, the diabetic can be guided to medical care that will bring the ailment under control and enable him to live a practically normal life.

In addition to the chairman, the local Diabetes Week committee includes:

Facilities for screening tests, which take only a few minutes of the individual's time, are included in the local committee's plans. All members of the Broward County Medical Association will do this test free during Diabetes Week, November 15-21. The Broward County Health Department is cooperating not only in adults, but also in screening school children.
