## 500 May Vote In Oakland Park Election Monday

### MRS. TUCKER PREDICTS UNUSUALLY HEAVY VOTE

A turnout of upwards of 70 percent of Oakland Park's 685 registered voters for next Monday's municipal election is entirely within the realm of possibility, City Clerk Elizabeth Tucker predicted this week. Mrs. Tucker declared she would not be at all surprised if more than 500 voters turned up at the polling place to cast ballots in the election. At stake are the mayor's chair and three seats at the City Council table. And the turnout is always heavy in Oakland Park when as many as three council vacancies are to be filled, the city clerk pointed out.

Not many predictions have been heard whose makers were willing to back them with wagers.

But the local observers of long standing were just about unanimous on one point:

It probably will be a hot election and in some cases, a close one.

Mayor Dewey Hawkins, who has served 13 consecutive terms except for one two-year period when he did not seek reelection, drew opposition at the last minute when Lee J. Duncan, operator of a concrete products firm, qualified for the mayor's race.

Neither, however, seemed to contemplate heavy campaigning.

Said Hawkins:

"Everybody knows I was not anxious to make the race but I am willing to serve the city for another term if the people want me."

Said Duncan:

"There ought to be some opposition and I am willing to serve if the people elect me."

In other words, the attitudes of the two opponents in the mayor's race seem to be very nearly alike.

#### Nine for Council

There aren't nearly enough council seats to go around for all the candidates who want to sit at the table for the next two years.

Nine of them are seeking election but six are certain to be disappointed, since only three vacancies are open.

The nine are:

C. R. Cone, Gene Delegal, Ethel M. Gordon, Ralph Green, Wallace Griffin, Charles M. Hunter, Eddie King, Bill Stevens and Henry Williams.

Hunter and Stevens are both present board members asking reelection. The third incumbent, T. C. Moore, is not seeking a new term.

Polls will open Monday at 7 a. m. in the Fire Hall and will close at 7 p. m.

### Wilton Manors Council May Complete Organization at Meeting On Tuesday

Wilton Manors' disrupted City Council, now in the throes of a 3-2 split among its membership, may be able to complete its reorganization at its second official meeting next Tuesday night. Whether this can be accomplished in the face of the open break which occurred a month ago, however, remains to be seen. At present, the city is without a police commissioner or road commissioner due to the disagreements among council members.

An effort was made at the first meeting of the new board to remove Councilman J. Marvin Brown as police commissioner and install new board member Charles A. Saxer in Brown's place.

Brown and Councilman Frank Starling blocked that move effectively at the time.

However, some smooth parliamentary maneuvering by Saxer, Councilman Clarence Riggs and Council President Earl Gurney might be able to break the block and get Saxer in as police commissioner.

If they accomplished this, the next question would be appointment of a road commissioner. Saxer and Riggs attempted to put Brown out of the police commissioner's post by nominating him for the road assignment. Brown flatly said he would not take it.

So, there you have it around and around she goes, and where she stops, nobody knows.

### Report Says Johns City Offices Move To New Location On Bridge Repairs

A report from Tallahassee said late this week that Acting Gov. Charley E. Johns has put his official approval on emergency action to repair or replace the broken Oakland Park drawbridge over the Intracoastal waterway.

The report was that County Commissioner Tony Salvo saw the governor in his office and that Johns agreed temporary replacement for the bridge is a genuine emergency.

According to the unofficial understanding of the conversations, work will start at once to get some kind of crossing at the Ocean Boulevard point.

Under the emergency status, it is understood, it will not be necessary to call for bids and thereby waste valuable time.

Local state road officials reportedly have been given a virtual free hand to proceed so that some crossing will be available in the shortest possible time.

Mayor Perry Mickel, several city council members, the police and fire chiefs and members of their respective departments, and others have been assisting the past few days in building desks and providing other installations in the new quarters.

All will have the same telephone number.

The new arrangement is expected to promote greater efficiency. It also is expected to provide space for the police department to carry out a new policy set by ordinance of registering employes of certain types of business establishments.

Consulting Engineer Plan Considered Monday

Wilton Manors City Councilmen are planning to hold an informal meeting next Monday afternoon to discuss naming of a consulting engineer to help work out city water problems, it was reported this week.

It was understood the councilmen will meet with John W. Greenleaf Jr., representative of a Miami engineering firm.

For some time, city officials have been debating possibilities of buying Ft. Lauderdale city water or installing a municipal plant for Wilton Manors.

## EDITORIAL COMMENT

### Criticism and Conscience

This community newspaper has been the target of some pretty sharp barbs recently for "printing rumors", reports which were circulated to the effect that an effort might be made to oust Wilton Manors Police Chief Beaney.

Most people, it is true, do not like rumors. Neither do we.

But it is also true that if newspapers printed nothing except what is handed to them from "official sources", they would have very little indeed to print.

When a newspaper gets its hands on a report from some obscure source that might have far-reaching consequences, it sometimes is necessary to publish that report in order to smoke out the facts.

Any newspaper worth its salt must sometimes draw criticism to itself in this way, even if the editor gets his feelings hurt as a result.

After all, it is his duty and responsibility to decide what he should and should not publish in the public interest.

We will continue to take that responsibility as honestly as possible. And our "letters to the editor" column is always open to anyone who wants to express disagreement or criticism.

In the current instance, none of our critics have seen fit to use this means of getting their attitudes across.

Wilton Manors' City Council, it appears, missed the boat a few weeks ago when it passed by a chance to take option on an ideal piece of park property east of the FEC railway. Councilman Earl Gurney had gotten the owners to offer the land to the City at a saving of several thousand dollars.

The Council failed to act, despite the urging of Gurney and the then Council President Earle Middleton.

The property is no longer available, having been bought by a group for the erection of a church building.

We are of course happy to see the land put to such a fine purpose but we would have preferred that this ideal park site be acquired by the City for that purpose.

Fortunately, another good park site has been offered as a gift by A. Hagen, who is to be commended for his action.

BOTH sites would not have been too much, however, and the fact that one site is available seems not to be credited to Council foresight but to Hagen and those who persuaded him to make the offer.

As this is written, we have reliable reports that Acting Gov. Charley Johns has given repair of the Old Oakland Park draw-bridge full emergency status.

The reports are that work will be started almost instantly to provide some kind of crossing of the Intracoastal waterway on Ocean Boulevard for the coming winter season.

The state and county officials responsible for the fast action on this matter are to be congratulated, and so are the Oakland Park-Wilton Manors-Fort Lauderdale teams that joined hands to give the officials a shove in that direction.

A full winter season under present traffic conditions would be disastrous for many of us. It would be unthinkable.

**DISEASE OF HOUSE PLANTS**

There are many ways to prevent diseases of house plants such as ferns, ivy, palms, etc. Spray your plants with a good force of water on an average of once every two weeks. This will knock most insects off and also a force of water is necessary so that dust which has accumulated on the plant can be washed off easily. Plants breathe through the pores in their leaves and if these are clogged up, they may soon be overcome by diseases.

Heavy leafed plants such as Sansevierias, (Mother-in-laws tongue), Rubber Plants and Palms should never be shined with a cloth dipped in any type of oil. This will close the pores of the leaves and soon they will shrivel. To keep the leaves clean and free from insects, wipe the leaves gently with a damp cloth and then shine with a dry cloth.

There are many types of insects which attach house plants. The most common are red spiders, aph-

ids, mealy bugs, plant lice, and scale insects.

**RED SPIDERS** produce a fine, mist cobweb that chokes the plant. Under this web you can see very small red spiders within the web. Plants showing signs of red spider should be sprayed with a force of water to wash the web off; also do not put a plant with this disease near other plants that are not infested.

Aphids which are the old faithful in this area are usually green and are in the form of small lice which multiply rapidly. Nicotine sulphate or Isotox give the best control for this insect.

Mealy bugs usually inhabit the joints of a plant and look like small white fuzzy specks. This insect is of the sucking variety and makes the plant turn yellow and lose its strength.

These are the worst of the house plant's enemies. With a little care and precaution, you may have the finest of plants.

The chorus of sixty voices is under the direction of Mrs. Edith Hammond the music teacher.

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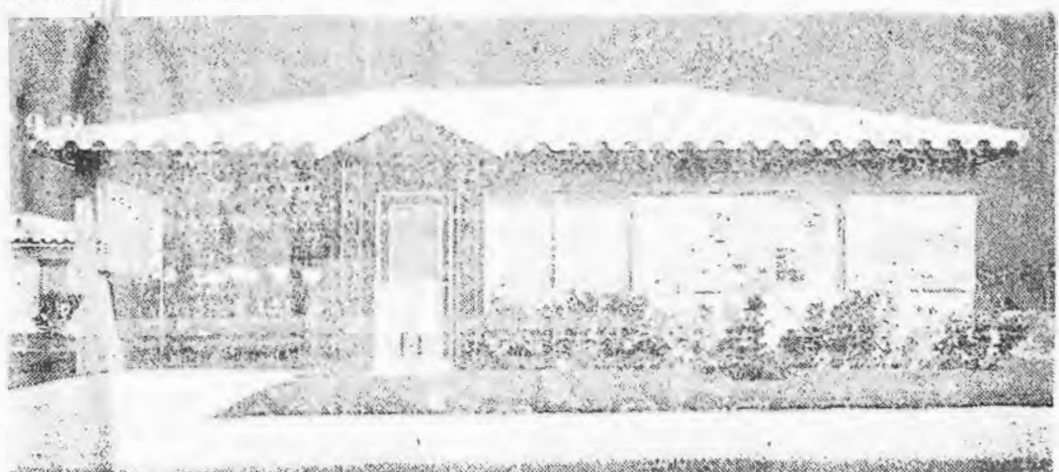
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
