Break Among Council Members Healed On One Point As Mayor Takes Charge

The question of naming police, fire and street commissioners for Wilton Manors will be decided by Mayor Perry Mickel; but the mayor will be in no hurry to make the appointments. This was an important cause of dissension among members of the new City Council apparently resolved Tuesday night.

Motion that the mayor take charge of the appointments, as the city charter provides, was offered by Councilman Frank Starling and seconded by Councilman Clarence Riggs.

Ultimate settlement of the issue had been a point of doubt since the new council's first regular meeting a month ago, when members could not agree on who would be police commissioner.

At that time, effort was made by Riggs to nominate Councilman Charles Saxer for the police assignment but he could get no second to his motion. Starling tried to nominate Councilman Marvin Brown but he could get no second either.

Riggs, who had been named fire commissioner at the meeting, resigned that post last night and was asked to be street commissioner. He agreed.

Mayor Mickel said afterwards that he doesn't know when he will take action on other appointments. "I think it will work out all right," he added.

Park Site Offer Accepted By Board

Wilton Manors City Council has accepted an offer of Alvar Hagen, Wilton Manors property owner, to donate to the city a large park site not far from the heart of the business district.

It is expected that the site will be developed as a park and recreation area for both youngsters and adults. The tract is located to the southeast of the rear of the Food Fair building on Wilton Drive, and is suitable for many types of development.

Basketball and tennis courts, shuffleboard courts, and perhaps a swimming pool might be constructed on the land, which is several hundred feet in length and ranges from 100 to 125 feet in width.

Hagen's offer to contribute the property was announced to the council at a regular meeting about a month ago.

Details of the transfer are expected to be worked out shortly.

Repairs Are Started On Waterway Bridge

Work has begun on repairs intended to connect Coral Ridge, Oakland Park and Wilton Manors once again to the north beach area but workmen are finding the job much more difficult than had been expected.

State road department officials were quoted as saying the old Oakland Park bridge was in even

worse shape than had been believed. And that was "saying nothing."

Nevertheless, the repair job which was declared an emergency by Acting Gov. Charley Johns is going ahead.

Nobody can predict exactly when the bridge will be in service again but officials said it will be restored with all possible haste.

Council Okays Payment For Office Furniture

At request of Clerk Wilton Manors City Council Tuesday night formally confirmed purchase of materials and office furniture ordered for the new temporary city offices on Wilton Drive.

Mrs. Marcia Stafford, city clerk, told the council she had bills on hand totaling \$421.23 for which there had been no authorization at any council meeting, including \$261.60 for furniture and office equipment and \$159.63 for materials.

Council members told the clerk the purchases had been approved at an "informal meeting" held on a Sunday.

At the clerk's request, a motion was made by Councilman Clarence Riggs ratifying the expenditures.

The new offices house the police, water and building departments. Telephone numbers remain the same: 3-3934 for police and fire calls, and 3-8826 for water and building departments.

Arrests Ordered For School Zone Speeders

Police Chief Richard Beaney this week announced that speeders caught violating the speed limits in school zones in the city will be arrested.

Beaney said patrolmen have been instructed to "write instead instead of talk" hereafter to stop the widespread practice of ignoring speed limit signs.

The chief said he will have a further statement to issue next week.

Hawkins, Hunter, Stevens And Delegal Victorious In Oakland Park Election

Mayor Dewey Hawkins was swept into a 14th term in office and three City Council members were named in the City's regular municipal election Monday when 443 of 685 registered voters went to the polls to cast ballots. The three successful candidates for City Council seats were Charles M. Hunter, Bill Stevens and Gene Delegal.

\$10,000 Is Voted To City Hall Fund

Ten thousand dollars was voted by the Wilton Manors City Council Tuesday night for transfer to the building fund for the proposed new City Hall.

Mayor Perry Mickel said the first phases of construction should be started before Christmas if plans proceed as expected.

Councilmen set a total rental figure of \$250 monthly for various city departments to pay into a fund to amortize loan to be made for construction.

In addition to the \$10,000 approved by the council, the building fund holds a \$750 check contributed by Broward Quarries, Inc., division of Maule Industries; a pledge of \$500 from former Council President Earle Middleton; \$1,250 to be paid by Covenant Presbyterian Church for purchase of a city-owned lot; and several additional pledges.

Several contractors, including Mickel, will donate time as contractors to supervise construction; a substantial amount of labor and materials will be contributed; and work such as terrazzo, plumbing, etc. will be let to sub-contractors.

Pay Raises For 2 Department Heads Get Official OK

Pay increases for Water Supt. Wallace Wakeley and Police Chief Richard Beaney were approved Tuesday night by the Wilton Manors City Council.

The water department head was given a raise from \$375 monthly to \$100 weekly, while the police chief's scale was upped from \$80 to \$90 a week.

Wakeley also was authorized to hire an assistant at \$1.50 per hour.

Councilmen also approved on first reading an ordinance providing registration of felons and persons employed in certain types of business.

Agreed to inspect in a body the area around NE 23rd Street where Manor Market is located, in answer to complaints leveled by Mrs. Ray Coleman and Mrs. Morgan Bryan, who demanded control of trucks on 23rd Street and erection of a wall along the market's parking lot to control traffic along the street.

Both Hunter and Stevens were incumbents who successfully sought re-election. Delegal takes the seat vacated by T. C. Moore, who did not run for another term. Although Mayor Hawkins held a substantial lead over his only opponent, Lee J. Duncan, the result was closer than some political observers had expected.

Hawkins polled 256 votes to Duncan's 168.

Mrs. Elizabeth Tucker was re-elected without opposition to a new term as city clerk. Although Mrs. Tucker had no opponent, 334 voters marked their ballots in her favor.

Hunter was high man in the council race with 184 votes; Stevens got 176; Delegal, 166; Eddie King, 155; C. R. Cone, 134; Miss Ethel Gordon, 114; Henry A. Williams, 100; Ralph Green, 97; and Wallace Griffin, 42.

The turnout for the voting was considered good although it did not quite come up to the 500 predicted by Mrs. Tucker.

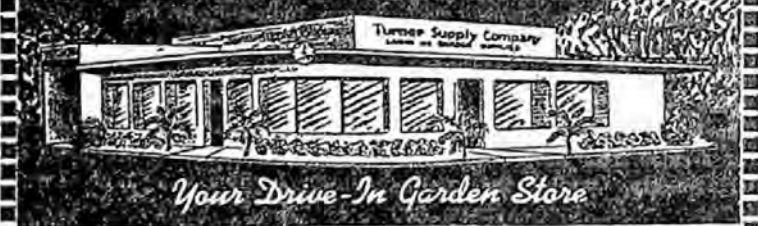
