Dear Sir:

Expression of appreciation for your efforts in publication of the Wilton Manors Charter are in order.

I would like to comment regarding the second paragraph of Article 2, Section 1 "To make their own (meaning the Wilton Manor Council) valuation for the purpose of municipal taxation, independend of the State and County Valuations".

The above privilege is 0.K. The governing body of Wilton Manors should have the right to set valuations, but why bother to set a legal rate of 7 mills, with the open end valuation clause which can used to increase the tax take any time the Council sees fit.

For example, suppose the first year the City used County valuations for tax purposes, then the next year wanted more money. They do not

Wilton Manors City Charter GENERAL MUNICIPAL POWERS, ARTICAL II SECTION 1

SECOND 20 PARAGRAPHS OF 46

21st To provide for and regulate the inspection of beef, pork, poultry, fish, flour, meal, milk, butter, lard and all other provisions, and oil and gasoline.

22nd To regulate the vending of milk, meat, poultry, fish, fruits and vegetables and all other articles of merchandise to be sold within said City.

23rd To establish and regulate markets.

24th To provide for the arrest, imprisonment and punishment of all vagrants and of riotous and disorderly persons within the City, by day or night, by warrant or otherwise.

25th To provide for the punishment of all breakers of the peace.

26th To disperse all disorderly assemblies on the Sabbath or secular days,

27th To enact all ordinances necessary to the public health.

28th To impose penalties on the owners, occupants, or agents of any house, walk, or sidewalk or other structure or place or thing which may be dangerous or detrimental to persons or property.

29th To provide for the organizing and maintenance of a police force and to improve wear, forfeitures and penalties and terms of imprisonment at hard labor or otherwise for a breach of a City ordinance, but no penalty shall exceed Five Hundred Dollars (\$500.00) and no terms of imprisonment shall be for a longer period than sixty (60) days for one and the same offense. The City Council may enter into a contract with other municipalities, or with the State and County authorities, for the housing of its prisoners, and is hereby authorized to pay said municipality or the State and County a reasonable fee for the use of its jails or prisons.

30th To provide for the imprisonment of offenders against the ordinance at hard labor on the streets or other public works of the City, to be designated by ordinance until the fines and costs adjudged against them by the judicial authority of the municipality are paid, the amount to be credited to such persons on account of fines and costs for each day's work shall be One Dollar (\$1.00) per day.

31st To regulate and provide for the construction of streets and paving the same, and for the construction and repair of sidewalks and foot pavements; and to erect and maintain bridges in said City; and to clean and clear vacant lots within the City which are in an unsightly or unsanitary condition, and to provide by ordinance for the levying of special assessments against property in the City to provide for payment of the construction, maintenance or work provided for under this Section.

32nd To grant the right-of-way through the streets, avenues and public grounds of the City for the purpose of street or other railways; provided that nothing in this Section shall be so construed as to deprive any abutting owner from recovering for any damage that he may suffer or be put to by the granting of such right-

33rd To construct and provide for the construction of sewers and drains and for keeping them in repair.

34th To construct and to provide for the construction, operation and maintenance of canals and ditches for drainage, irrigation and transportation purposes. Cont. on page 2

35th To regulate and restrict the location of trades and industries and the location of buildings designed for specific uses; to regulate the height, bulk and construction of buildings hereafter created and to this end and for that purpose to divide the City into zones in such number, shape and area and to provide for the enforcement of such ordinances and regulations.

36th To take appropriate private grounds, in manner and form provided by law or by condemnation for widening streets or parts thereof, or for extending the same or for laying out or extending of new streets, avenues, squares, sewers, or drains, when the public conveniences may require it, or for the construction and maintenance thereon of any municipal plants, works or for any other necessary public purpose.

37th To prohibit the dumping of filth, dirt, garbage, shells, trash, refuse or other things in the waters of any body of water within the City limits, or any body of water adjacent to or adjoining the City limits.

38th To provide for the punishment of any person or corporation that shall sell or dispose of any article, commodity or thing by weight or measure, and shall deliver to the purchaser a smaller quantity for the consideration than that agreed upon between the seller and the purchaser.

39th To have and to exercise jurisdiction over the commission of all offenses against the public health, decency or morals within the said City and within one (1) mile of the corporate limits of said City.

40th To adopt, use and change the corporate seal of the City.
