WILTON MANORS TO RUSH CITY HALL PLANS

Food Fair Gives Land

A deed for property immediately east of Wilton Drive in the rear of the Atlantic Service Station, was handed to the council by Wilton Manors' Mayor, Frank Starling. The deed was the result of negotiations with Food Fair executives to acquire the approximately 250 ft. by 150 ft.

piece of property for a city hall site. Food Fair donated the plot of ground to the city of Wilton Manors. Along with a 100 ft. square piece of property directly across NE 6 Ave, recently purchased from McJunkin for \$3500, the city now has ample space to build a city hall, police station and fire house.

Mayor Starling urged the council to choose an architect immediately, so that plans could be put on the drawing boards in order to get construction started soon.

NINE IMPORTANT ITEMS ON AGENDA OF CENTRAL COMMITTEE

At the First National Bank Auditorium, Monday evening, July 9th at 8 PM, the Central Committee of Improvement Associations will discuss nine important items:

1. Discussion of Budgets.
2. Why are School Officials afraid of Elections.
3. Are Sanitation Officials going to stop development by demanding Sanitary Sewer Systems.
4. Why should the City buy Federal Hwy. Right-of-Way.
5. Irregular property valuations in the County.
6. What can be done about abating the dangerous situation regarding the plane landing training area of Marine planes.
7. What does the City get from big County tax collection.
8. Can we control the two exhaust pipe fad and the rolling death traps of hot-rodgers.
9. County zoning should be passed only after all adjoining property owners are notified by Registered Mail.

ZONING REQUEST GETS 'NO'

A zoning hearing Tuesday evening, July 3rd, attracted a record number of objectors to the Wilton Manors council meeting. Proposed was a change in the zoning of three lots in the 1800 block of 26 street from R2 to R3, a designation which would allow the owners to build a doctor's clinic.

After Attorney Wm. Leonard, representing the owners, presented arguments in favor of the change, a flood of protest came from a large group of persons owning properties in the neighborhood.

On a motion by councilman Stevens to turn down the request, councilmen Middleton and Burnell voted no, with Richardson, Joslin, and Stevens defeating the request for a change by voting yes.

ROAD ROUTE UNITES OPPOSITION

The State Road Board's proposed Interama Road through Hollywood residential district has brought united opposition from civic and improvement organizations, Hollywood Chamber of Commerce, and numerous city officials.

Officials of Ft. Lauderdale, the Central Committee of Improvement Associations of Fort Lauderdale will do their share of objecting too.

"Dumping of the additional traffic created by Interama into South Federal Highway would make traffic conditions deplorable," said P.G. Wilson, Chairman of CCIA.

Hollywood Chamber of Commerce will send an appeal to Governor Collins as a first step. Court action may be planned by Hollywood organizations if it becomes necessary.

CONTROLLED PARKING FOR WILTON DRIVE

Consideration of a report by a committee on controlled parking on Wilton Drive helped swell the assembly at Wilton Manors Council Room Tuesday evening, July 3rd. Reports that the committee would present a plan for parking meters brought protest from all business people present. An original petition by merchants in the 2000 and 2100 block of Wilton Drive requested controlled parking by use of one hour signs. After hearing views of the business people, the Council voted to install two hour parking signs the length of the business district on Wilton Drive.
