WILLTON MANORS TO RUSH CITY HALL PLANS

Food Fair Gives Land

A deed for property immediately east of Wilton Drive in the rear of the Atlantic Service Station, was handed to the council by Wilton Manors' Mayor, Frank Starling. The deed was the result of negotiations with Food Fair executives to acquire the approximately 250 ft. by 150 ft.

piece of property for a city hall site. Food Fair donated the plot of ground to the city of Wilton Manors. Along with a 100 ft. square piece of property directly across NE 6 Ave, recently purchased from McJunkin for \$3500, the city now has ample space to build a city hall, police station and fire house.

Mayor Starling urged the council to choose an architect immediately, so that plans could construction started soon.

A zoning hearing Tuesday evening, July 3rd, attracted a record number of objectors to the Wilton Manors council meeting. Proposed was a change in the zoning of three lots in the 1800 block of 26 street from R2 to R3, a designation which would allow the owners to build a doctor's clinic.

1. Discussion of Bud-ROAD ROUTE UNITES **OPPOSITION**

The State Road Board's proposed Interama Road through Hollywood residential district has brought united opposition from civic and improvement organizations, Hollywood Chamber of Commerce, and numerous city officials.

Officials of Ft. Lauderdale, the Central Committee of Improveorganizations and Fort Lauderdale will do their share of objecting too.

"Dumping of the additional traffic created by Interama into South Federal Highway would make traffic conditions deplorable," said P.G. Wilson, Chairman of CCIA.

Hollywood Chamber of Commerce will send an appeal to Governor Collins as a first step. Court action may be planned by Hollywood organizations if it becomes necessary.




